#### 1 <u>Introduction</u>

- 1.1 The Law Society of Western Australia (**Society**) is the peak association for the legal profession in Western Australia.
- 1.2 Section 276(1) of the *Legal Profession Act 2008* (Act) requires the Legal Costs Committee to review each costs determination in force at least once in the period of 2 years after the determination was made and in each period of 2 years after that period.
- 1.3 Section 278(1)(a) of the Act requires the Legal Costs Committee to give written notice to the Society of its intention to make or review a costs determination.
- 1.4 Written notice to the Society was made by letter dated 2 December 2014 from the Chair of the Legal Costs Committee, Ted Sharp.
- 1.5 The Society comments as follows.

#### 2 Maximum allowable hourly rates

2.1 The table below shows the current maximum allowable hourly rates in item 7 of the Legal Practitioners (*Solicitors Costs*) *Determination 2013* (**Solicitors Costs Scale**), subparagraph 4(e)(1) of the Legal Practitioners (*Non-Contentious Probate Costs*) *Determination 2013* (**Probate Scale**) and item 8(d) of the *Legal Practitioners* (*Supreme Court*) (*Contentious Business*) *Determination 2014* (**Supreme Court Scale**).

- 2.2 In 2014 the Legal Costs Committee increased the 2012 Supreme Court Scale by approximately 6% inclusive of GST. The current Supreme Court Scale commenced on 1 July 2014 and will be reviewed in 2016.
- 2.3 The 2013 Solicitors Costs Scale and the Probate Scale came into operation on 1 July 2013. The Solicitors Costs Scale and Probate Scale to issue following this review are expected to commence on 1 July 2015, to next be reviewed in 2017.
- 2.3 As the Legal Costs Committee's biennial review of the Solicitors Costs Scale and Probate Scale is historically conducted in the year between reviews of the Supreme Court Scale, historically the maximum allowable hourly rates in the Solicitors Costs Scale and Probate Scale are increased, following the biennial review, to amounts higher than the maximum allowable hourly rates in the current Supreme Court Scale.

#### 3 Consumer Price Index and Wages Index

- 3.1 In reviewing and determining the maximum allowable hourly rates in a costs scale it is appropriate that the Legal Costs Committee take into account the movement in the Consumer Price Index and Wages Index. Increases in the Consumer Price Index and Wages Index necessarily impact on the costs of running a law practice and therefore on the provision of professional legal services in all areas of legal work.
- 3.2 **Annexure 1** to this submission is the Australian Bureau of Statistics Consumer Price Index Tables from September 2013 to September 2014. Index numbers for Perth were as follows:

3.3 Based on an average quarterly increase of 0.5 between December 2014 and June 2017, the CPI index at June 2017 could increase by a further 5.5%, a total of 9.4% between September 2013 and June 2017.

3.4 Annexure 2 is Australian Bureau of Statistics Wages Index Tables showing percentage changes for each quarter between December 2013 and September 2014. The percentage changes in the private sector and all sectors were:

#### 4 Increases in court fees

- 4.1 **Annexure 3** is letters dated 7 November 2013 and 24 June 2014 from Mr Ray Warnes, Executive Director, Court and Tribunal Services.
- 4.2 In his letter of 24 June 2014, Mr Warnes advised that the amendments to the various fee regulations effective from 1 July 2014 were made *"to provide an increase in court fees to match the movement in costs as determined by the Department. Fees and charges under these Regulations have been increased by 2.6%."* Effective from 15 November 2013, the fees for each jurisdiction were increased by 13.6% *"to match the movement in costs determined by the Department."*

#### 5 <u>Solicitors Costs Scale Item 4</u> (Settlement of a Contract for the Sale of Land under the Transfer of Land Act 1893) and Settlement Agents (Remuneration) Notice 2013 (Settlement Agents Scale)

- 5.1 Solicitors have a higher standard of care than do settlement agents. In *Cusamo v Pinner (1998) 157 ALR 61* Justice Carr of the Federal Court held that the duty of care of a settlement agent in representing a purchaser of real property is less than the duty of care of a solicitor acting in the same capacity. A solicitor is expected to advise the purchaser of his/her rights under the contract. Settlement agents are required, when non-routine matters arise, to recommend to their clients that they seek the advice of a solicitor.
- 5.2 The following table shows that the maximum amounts in item 5 of the 2013 Solicitors Costs Scale are approximately 3% lower than the maximum amounts in the 2013 Settlement Agents Scale.

#### 6 Probate Scale Paragraph 4 – Costs

- 6.1 Subparagraphs 4(a) to (d) set maximum fixed costs for various legal services.
- 6.2 Subparagraph 4(a) sets a maximum amount of \$1,650 (inclusive of GST) in the case of an application for a Grant of Probate to the Supreme Court of Western Australia or to reseal a Grant of Probate made outside Western Australia within another Australian jurisdiction.
- 6.3 Subparagraph 4(d) sets a maximum amount of \$924 where the law practice for the applicant for a Grant or to reseal a Grant of Probate or Letters of Administration does not carry on practice in the Perth Metropolitan Area and engages a law practice in Perth as agent in connection with the application. The amount of \$924 is specified as the equivalent of 2 hours of a Senior Practitioner's time at the maximum hourly rate in subparagraph 4(e).
- 6.4 Section 263(a) of the Act (Exceptions to requirement for disclosure) provides that "...if a law practice becomes aware that the total legal costs are likely to exceed \$1 500 (exclusive of GST) or the amount prescribed by the regulations (whichever is higher), the law practice must disclose the matters in section 260 or 261 (as the case requires) to the client as soon as practicable."

6.5 It is stated in the *Legal Practitioners (Non-Contentious Probate Costs) Report 2010*, in which the fixed costs were introduced to the Probate Scale that:

"The Committee recognises that there can be degrees of complexity associated with the Applications described in paragraph (a) of this clause 4. In those cases, law practices should be entitled to charge the hourly rates described in sub-paragraphs (e)(1) or (2) (as the case requires) of clause 5 of the Determination. However, the Committee considers it is inappropriate for law practices to be able to charge for time spent on satisfying requisitions issued by the Supreme Court of Western Australia in connection with any of the Applications described in paragraph (a) of this clause 4 where those requisitions relate to matters in respect of which a competent local legal practitioner practising in the Probate Jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of Western Australia would not have overlooked or erred."

- 6.6 The Society does not disagree with these comments. However, increases in the costs of running a law practice apply to the provision of all legal services. The maximum amount payable by a client to a law practice for the legal service described in subparagraph 4(a) has remained unchanged since March 2010, a period of 5 years. The next review is not due until 2017. If not increased this year, this amount will remain unchanged for a period of at least 7 years.
- 6.7 If the amount in subparagraph 4(a) is increased, a law practice can choose to charge less than the fixed maximum amount if it does not want to comply with disclosure obligations under the Act.
- 6.8 It is submitted that the maximum amount of \$924 in subparagraph 4(d) should be increased to the equivalent of the maximum fixed amount in subparagraph 4(a). The law practice must take instructions, gather all necessary information, prepare the application, attend to lodge the application and report to the client following the reseal of the application. Two hours is insufficient. The time that needs to be spent on a straightforward matter of this kind is at least four hours.

#### 7 <u>Submission</u>

7.1 It is the Society's submission that the increases as itemised below are fair and reasonable, particularly as the increases will be prospective.

- (1) The maximum allowable hourly rates in Item 7 of the Solicitors Costs Scale should be increased by 6% (inclusive of GST) rounded up or down to be divisible by 11.
- (2) The maximum amounts in Item 5 of the Solicitors Costs Scale should be increased by 6% (inclusive of GST) rounded up or down to be divisible by 11.
- (3) The maximum cost of \$1,650 (inclusive of GST) in subparagraph 4(a) of the Probate Scale should be increased by 10% rounded up or down to be divisible by 11.
- (4) The amount of \$924 (inclusive of GST) in subparagraph 4(d) of the Probate Scale should be increased to an amount equivalent to the maximum cost in subparagraph 4(a), following this review.
- (5) The fixed allowances in Parts 4(b) to (d) of the Probate Scale should be increased by 6% inclusive of GST, rounded up or down to be divisible by 11.
- (6) The maximum allowable hourly rates in subparagraph 4(e)(1) of the Probate Scale should be increased by 6% inclusive of GST, rounded up or down to be divisible by 11.

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

### CAPITAL CITIES COMPARISON

#### ALL GROUPS CPI



All Groups CPI, Percentage change from previous quarter

At the All groups level, the CPI rose in all eight capital cities during the September quarter 2014.

The food and non-alcoholic beverages group was the most significant positive contributor to the All groups quarterly movement. The group recorded rises in all eight capital cities. Hobart (+2.3%) recorded the largest movement, mainly driven by increases in fruit.

At the eight capital cities level, the housing group was the second most significant contributor to the All groups quarterly movement (+0.5%), recording rises in five capital cities. The largest city movement was recorded by Adelaide (+2.0%), driven by the removal of a government Emergency Services Levy remission for non-concession ratepayers. Brisbane (+1.4%) recorded rises, mainly due to increases in electricity network charges.

The most significant negative contributors to the quarterly movement were the communication group (-1.4%) and the clothing and footwear group (-1.0%). The communication group recorded decreases in all eight capital cities, mainly due to falls in telecommunication equipment and services. The clothing and footwear group recorded falls in all cities with the exception of Brisbane where the most significant positive contributor was garments for men. The largest decreases for the clothing and footwear.

Over the twelve months to the September quarter 2014, the All groups CPI rose in all capital cities with the largest positive movements recorded in Darwin (+2.7%) and Perth (+2.6%). Hobart (+1.9%) recorded the smallest rise over the twelve months to the September quarter 2014.



## **CAPITAL CITIES COMPARISON**

### ALL GROUPS CPI

All Groups CPI, Percentage change from previous quarter



At the All groups level, the CPI rose in all capital cities during the June quarter 2014.

The housing group was the most significant positive contributor to the All groups quarterly movement. The group recorded rises in seven of the eight capital cities. The largest movement was recorded in Melbourne (+1.3%), driven by increases in new dwelling purchase by owner-occupiers. Adelaide (-1.0%) was the only city to record a fall for the housing group, due to the seasonal switch to off-peak pricing for electricity.

At the eight capital cities level, the health group was the second largest positive contributor to the All groups quarterly movement (+2.9%), showing increases in all cities. The most significant contributor was the increase in medical and hospital services in all capital cities, most notably in Hobart (+3.7%) and Adelaide (+3.4%).

The most significant negative contributor to the All groups quarterly movement was the transport group (-0.7%), recording falls in six capital cities. The largest city movements were recorded by Melbourne (-1.0%) and Adelaide (-0.9%) driven by falls in automotive fuel.

Over the twelve months to the June quarter 2014, the All groups CPI rose in all capital cities with the largest positive movements recorded in Perth (+3.3%) and Darwin (+3.3%). Canberra (+2.2%) recorded the smallest rise over the twelve months to the June quarter 2014.

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

### CAPITAL CITIES COMPARISON

#### ALL GROUPS CPI

All Groups CPI, Percentage change from previous quarter



At the All groups level, the CPI rose in all capital cities during the March quarter 2014.

The alcohol and tobacco group was the most significant positive contributor to the All groups quarterly movement. The group recorded rises in all capital cities, with the largest movement recorded in Hobart (+3.3%) mainly due to rises in tobacco.




