 Maximum rates
- 1.1 The maximum hourly rates in Item 7 of the Solicitors Costs Scale and Item 5(1) of the Probate Scale (other than for practitioners admitted for less than 5 years) are lower than the hourly rates in the (Supreme Court) (Contentious Business) Determination 2010 ("Supreme Court Scale") as shown in the following table.

- 1.2 The Legal Costs Committee's biennial review of the Solicitors Costs Scale has historically been conducted (and again this year) in the year following the biennial review of the Supreme Court Scale. As a result the maximum rates in the Solicitors Costs Scale have historically been higher, following the biennial review, than the amounts in the Supreme Court Scale.
- 1.3 The Solicitors Costs Scale came into operation on 1 October 2009. The Legal Costs Committee's 2009 Report states that:

"Before making the Solicitors Costs Determination 2009, the Legal Costs Committee:

- (a) reviewed the submission of the Law Society of Western Australia Inc....; and
- (b) reviewed the impact of movements in the Consumer Price Index and Labour Price Index for the period between June 2007 and June 2009 (inclusive)."
- 1.4 Although the Probate Scale did not come into operation until March 2010, the general maximum rates were set to accord with those in the Solicitors Costs Scale.
- 1.5 Attached at Annexure 1 is the Australian Bureau of Statistics Consumer Price Index Table from 2006 to December 2010. The percentage increase for Perth between June 2009 and June 2010 was 3.5%.
- 1.6 Attached at Annexure 2 is the Australian Bureau of Statistics Labour Price Index Table at September 2010 and December 2010. In the former it is stated that the change from 2008-2009 to 2009-2010 was 3.4%, with the private sector increasing by 3.0% and the public sector by 4.5%. The latter shows that the total hourly rates of pay between the December quarter 2009 and the December quarter 2010 was a percentage increase of 3.8% in the private sector and 3.9% in the public sector.
- 1.7 Attached at Annexure 3 is a letter dated 1 March 2011 from Mr Ray Warnes, Executive Director, Court and Tribunal Services, advising of fee increases from 9 March 2011. In his letter, Mr Warnes advised that various amendments to various fee regulations will be made "to provide an increase in court fees of 2.1% to reflect the recommended 2010-11 CPI movement rate advised by the Department of Treasury and Finance."
- 1.8 Based on the Australian Bureau of Statistics data and the information provided by the Executive Director, Court and Tribunal Services, it can be said that the increase in the Consumer Price Index between 1 July 2009 and 30 June 2011 will be in the order of 5.6%.
- Legal Practitioners (Solicitors Costs) Determination 2009 ("Solicitors Costs Scale"), ITEM 5 The Settlement of a Contract for the Sale of Land under the Transfer of Land Act 1893
- 2.1 The following table shows that the maximum amount in Item 5 of the Solicitors Costs Scale when acting for a purchaser is lower than the maximum amount in the Settlement Agents (Remuneration) Notice 2008 ("Settlement Agents Scale").

The maximum amount is also significantly lower for a solicitor acting for the vendor of a property valued between \$500,001 and \$1,000,000 (the majority of domestic properties in the Perth metropolitan area).

NOTE: It is drawn to the attention of the Legal Costs Committee that the Maximum Amount or % in Item 5 as currently published on the Legal Costs Committee's website is not in alignment with the relevant "Consideration (\$)".

2.2 Solicitors have a higher standard of care than do settlement agents. In Cusamo v Pinner (1998) 157 ALR 61 Justice Carr of the Federal Court held that the duty of care of a settlement agent in representing a purchaser of real property is less than the duty of care of a solicitor acting in the same capacity. The fundamental difference is that a solicitor is expected to advise the purchaser of his/her rights under the contract. Settlement agents are required, when non-routine matters arise, to recommend to their clients that they seek the advice of a solicitor.

3. Recommendations

- That the Maximum Rates in Item 7 of the Legal Practitioners (Solicitors Costs) Determination 2009 be increased by 6% inclusive of GST, rounded up or down to be divisible by 11.
- 2. That the Maximum Amounts in Item 5 of the Legal Practitioners (Solicitors Costs) Determination 2009 be increased by 6% inclusive of GST, rounded up or down to be divisible by 11.
- 3. That the General Maximum rates in Item 5(1) of the Legal Practitioners (Solicitors Non-Contentious Probate Costs) Determination 2010 be increased by 6% inclusive of GST, rounded up or down to be divisible by 11.

1.4 To support of these recommendations the Law Society relies on the information set out in paragraphs 1.1 to 2.2. Increases in the Consumer Price Index and Labour Price Index necessarily impact on the cost of providing professional legal services in all areas of legal work. The Law Society submits that an increase of 6% is fair and reasonable as the increase will be prospective.





QUARTERLY CHANGE (SEP QTR 2010 TO DEC QTR 2010)

- The index for all employee jobs in Australia increased by 0.9%, in trend terms.
- The increase in indexes (in original terms) at the industry level ranged from 0.3% for Accommodation and food services to 1.5% for Electricity, gas, water and waste services.

ANNUAL CHANGE (DEC QTR 2009 TO DEC QTR 2010)

- The increase in the trend index through the year to December guarter 2010 for all employee jobs in Australia was 3.8%.
- Increases in the original indexes though the year to the December quarter 2010 at the industry level ranged from 2.9% for Transport, postal and warehousing to 4.7% for Electricity, gas, water and waste services.

IMPACT OF THE FLOODS

Flooding began in Queensland in late December 2010, and then spread to other states. Price collection and processing for the December quarter 2010 was not affected by the floods.

CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

The distribution of employers' expenditure on wages and salaries, as provided in Appendix 1, is updated in the December quarter each year. An explanation of the use of employers' expenditure data is provided in paragraphs 30 and 31 of the Explanatory Notes. The December quarter 2010 update has sourced estimates from the 2010 Survey of Employee Earnings and Hours to ensure the most contemporary information on employer expenditure patterns is used in the compilation of the wage price index.





CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

In September quarter 2010, the seasonally adjusted and trend series have been reanalysed to account for the change in timing of minimum wage decisions on the wage price index (WPI). Revisions to the seasonally adjusted and trend series impact the period 2006-2009 when changes to minimum wage rates occurred at a different time in the year to what is expected under Fair Work Australia. A trend break has been applied between June quarter and September quarter 2009 to remove the effect on the underlying trend series of the Australian Fair Pay Commission's decision not to increase minimum wages in 2009. (See Explanatory Notes paragraphs 38-47).

A new graph WPI-Annual change: original, States and Territories appears for the first time on the front page of the publication in September quarter 2010. The graph WPI-Annual

change: original (for selected industries) has been removed from the front page and now appears with the commentary (pages 5-7). This shift has enabled the inclusion of all industries and quarterly changes in the graph.
